Course Information

Geology 9601y. **Regional Field Geology**

A ten-day field trip to study aspects of the Appalachian Orogen in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. 1st September to 10th September, 2022.

Prerequisites

Graduate students planning to take this course should have a reasonable grounding in igneous and sedimentary petrology, and in structural geology. Participation is at the discretion of the instructor. Course fees for Accelerated Masters students are included in their Academic Fees. Other graduate students are responsible for partial costs (\$400 in 2022). A \$200 deposit is payable by April 30th and the balance by August 1st 2022.
