2. ACADEMIC CONCERNS

The penalties for a student guilty of a scholastic offence (including plagiarism) include refusal of a passing grade in the assignment, failure in the course, suspension from the University, and expulsion from the University.

Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI) Tools:

Use of generative AI tools when prohibited or in a way not specifically allowed is a scholastic offence and subject to the penalties for a scholastic offence outlined in the Academic
