Course Description

Revolutions in America and France gave rise to the revolutions in art which have come to be known as Romanticism. Affecting all genres and every discipline, Romantic revolutions shook up established genres and transformed understandings of the world in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries and continue to influence us today. This course examines aesthetic, sociopolitical, philosophical, and psychological thinking from English Romanticism. We will study the complexities and ironies in Romantic writing, while exploring both the revolutionary potential and limitations of multiple romanticisms.
