Budget 2022-23 Senate April 22, 2022

Context / Background

Western navigated reasonably well through the Global Pandemic – and now moving forward

Western has a new Strategic Plan

Investments in Strategic Priorities started in last year's budget

Overall enrolments and our fiscal situation remain strong

Over 36,800 FTEs in the current year - a 9.2% growth over a two year period



Revenue Parameters

Provincial Government Base Operating Grants frozen at 2016-17 levels – under the Corridor System

Domestic Tuition

Our budget is based on continuation of freeze

However, after development of our budget, Province has allowed for 5% increases in domestic Out-of-Province students

We will develop proposals to implement the allowable increases

International Tuition proposals continue with same patterns of increases as recent years



Looking Forward

Planning for a 1-Year Budget (2022-23) to be followed by a 3-Year Plan (2023-26)

Faculties and Support Units developing Academic and Operational Plans respectively To be submitted by June 2022


