Course Description:

The course will explore the monument from antiquity to the present. We will examine historical objects, buildings, sculptures, squares, etc. and the role of the individual(s) and/or community, religious, institutional, and state groups that commissioned these objects. We will establish a historical understanding of monuments primarily in the Western world, but we will interrogate these monuments through colonial, racial, gender, and other theoretical frameworks to understand to deconstruct their called universal commonalities of monuments like the Column of Trajan to Stone Mountain (GA).
