SA 3611 — Drawing (Fall 2023 - Winter 2024)

Calendar Description

Continuation of drawing as perceptual, technical, conceptual **and**ctices. Students will delve deeply into technical and conceptual approaches to traditional and expansive forms of drawing. In-class drawing activities, workshops, studio projects, research-materials, and collaborative group discussions and critiques will cumulatively support students to develop increasingly self-directed awareness, skills, and methodologies.

Upon successful completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- Utilize drawing materials and methods as tools for artistic research and expression
- Demonstrate technically diverse modes of rendering with a variety of drawing materials
- Demonstrate technical, analytical, and critical awareness of drawing in contemporary studio art practices
- Hone personally distinct explorations utilizing drawing methods and/or materials
- Explore the potential dissemination, display, and exhibition of drawing-based artwork
- Contextualize their own and others' work in relation to contemporary and historic drawing and studio art practices
- Address and constructively discuss their own and peers' work, contributing to a cooperative in-class community
